# Chairman's Report



**Protestant Aid faced further challenges in 2022, with a dramatic increase in demand for our services. This was demonstrated by an overall increase of 22% in General Grant Applications compared to the previous year, resulting in the highest number of appeals for assistance since our foundation.**

Our Grants Committee, chaired by David Pierce, along with our Charitable Services Team of Geoff Scargill and Joyce Sparkes, has dealt with a huge workload this year and I would like to record my gratitude for their tireless work.

It is expected we will be under further pressure this year as the impact of inflation on low-income households will put many people at risk of serious poverty. Inflation often hits the poorest in society hardest and sadly we expect more and more people to seek our support as they struggle this year.

During 2022, we made a number of Special Supports available with the mounting number of refugees arriving from Ukraine.

We were able to help struggling families, accounting for more than 200 students, through applications received from Primary Schools in Ireland. Protestant Aid also supported the refurbishment of houses for Ukrainian refugees at Kingston College, Mitchelstown, County Cork which recently featured on RTE's **DIYSOS - Big Build**. I would congratulate the Committee on acting so quickly to provide this urgent help for people whose lives have been affected so badly by the invasion of their country.

**We continue to be most grateful for the grant of €180,000 from the Department of Rural and Community Development and I am able to report that we again distributed in excess of €1 for every €1 we received in donations across the Republic of Ireland.**

Our Nursing Homes continue to flourish, with The Brabazon Trust catering for over 100 residents split between the Nursing Home and Sheltered Housing accommodation and St. John's House providing care for 56 people in its redeveloped facility on the Merrion Road. The precarious position of smaller nursing homes in Ireland has been well highlighted in the media in the last year with many closing their doors due to cost pressures. We continue to seek more equitable rates from the National Treatment Purchase Fund (Fair Deal Scheme) as costs have increased substantially in recent years.

There have been changes to key personnel in the last year as Anne Kavanagh, Director of Nursing in St. John's House and Susan Anderson, Director of Nursing in Brabazon House, retired after many years of dedicated service - we thank them for their contribution over all those years.

## **COMPASSION IN ACTION**

### **Devastating illness causes financial distress**

Unemployed couple John and Mary\* have two children, the youngest of whom has mental health issues. John was recently admitted to Hospital and has been diagnosed with Pulmonary Fibrosis. Sadly, he is now under the care of the Palliative Team and will not be returning home. John's income reduced dramatically when he became ill and the family has significant debts. They could not afford the €500 to have their car repaired - vital as they live rurally. A financially and emotionally devastating situation.

### **PA Response**

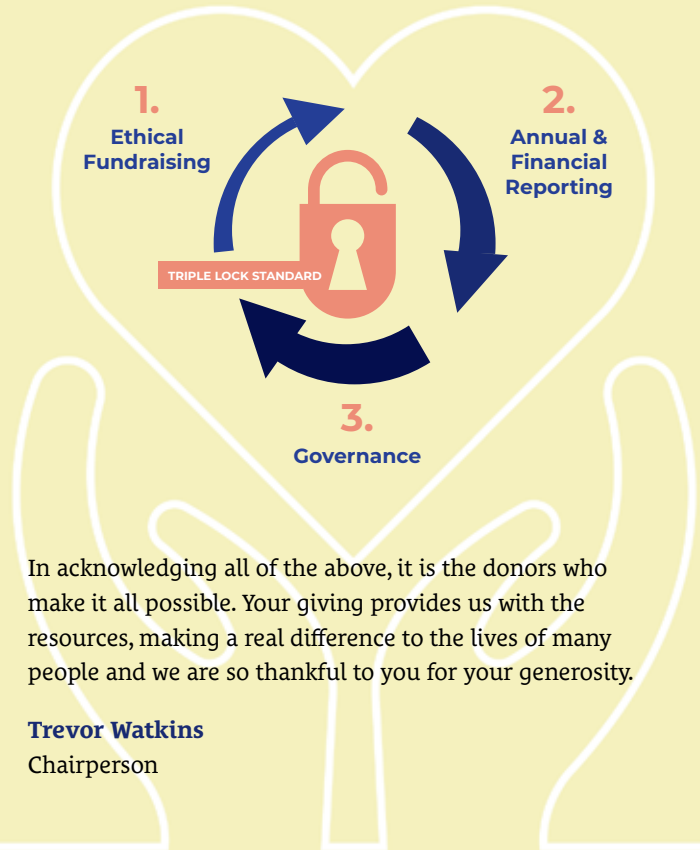
A grant was given to ensure their car could be repaired and get this family back on the road. Unfortunately, we cannot solve every problem, but thanks to the kindness of our donors we can reduce some of the financial burden our applicants are facing.

Our Chief Executive continues to provide much needed support to the Board, particularly as he guides us through an ever-changing landscape of Governance, Risk and Regulation. Achieving the highest standards of good governance and transparency remains a fundamental consideration for the Board and we have recently signed up to the Charity Institute Ireland's (CII's) "Triple Lock" standard which is a mark of 'best practice' in Governance.

**Finally, I want to express my sincere thanks to all the Board members who have been so supportive this year - it has been greatly appreciated. Thanks also to our Patron, Archbishop Michael Jackson, who has been and continues to be, consistently supportive of the aims and aspirations of Protestant Aid. His encouraging words and help have been deeply appreciated.**



In acknowledging all of the above, it is the donors who make it all possible. Your giving provides us with the resources, making a real difference to the lives of many people and we are so thankful to you for your generosity.

# Chief Executive's Report



**Thank you for taking the time to read our Annual Report for 2022, which I hope you will find informative and thought provoking. We leave behind us another difficult year marked by the war in Ukraine, a continuing housing crisis and rising inflation.**

Last year, Protestant Aid was proactive in finding creative ways of helping those struggling with financial hardship as applications for emergency support increased to record levels.

We also launched a special financial package for Ukrainians arriving on our shores, providing much-needed relief to people in an immediate and significant way where there was nowhere else to turn. We are in the midst of an energy poverty crisis with average annual electricity costs rising from around €1,000 to over €2,100 in just a couple years.

**Low-income households now face heart-breaking decisions whether to feed the family or heat the house. To be poor - especially with children to support - is a perpetual balancing act.**

At Protestant Aid, we see on a daily basis, the harsh realities faced by many and it is clearly the case that employment does not always guarantee a decent standard of living. With the support of you our donors, you have made it possible for us to give people living on the margins some light, dignity and importantly, hope.

In our efforts to deliver on our mission, our Board has developed a new strategy setting out a roadmap for the next phase of Protestant Aid's development with a number of 'core priorities' identified in the next 5 years. At the top of the list is to increase our giving and grow our impact on society. The importance of this cannot be overstated.

**Last year, our general grant giving increased by 26% and it is our aim to continue this growth with a commitment to poverty alleviation and social justice. We will also seek to improve efficiencies and operational delivery and progress to a full digital transformation during this new chapter.**

In both our Nursing Homes, Brabazon House and St John's House, we will continue our priority of delivering state-of-the-art services and the highest levels of care. We will also aim to deliver a balanced budget for each facility and achieve a 'break even' position or better.

This will include attention on improving our accommodation and continue to ensure we have a fully HIQA-compliant infrastructure. Focus on staff retention will continue to be prioritised as it has far-reaching consequences in a Care Home setting, where continuity of care is a key driver of better outcomes for our Residents.



**Last year, we helped more people than ever before and this trend will continue for the foreseeable future. The generosity of you our donors makes it possible for us to carry out our work and for that we are truly humbled and grateful.**

I would also like to recognise the efforts of all the volunteers and staff for their dedication and commitment in achieving our goals. Everyone has stepped up to the plate in the busiest year in our 180+ year history. Thank you so much for your commitment.

Lastly, I would like to acknowledge the important contributions of Mr. George Good, Mrs. Yvonne Good and Canon David Gillespie who have recently retired from the Protestant Aid Board - we are very grateful for their many years of dedication to our mission.

## **COMPASSION IN ACTION**

### **Rising energy bills cause financial stress**

Single unemployed mother Andrea\* has three young children. She is a regular and faithful parishioner but lives in a socially deprived area where drugs and anti-social behaviour are rampant. A very sad life to date - abused as a child and put into care following her mother's alcohol abuse. She has serious medical issues and is struggling to manage her rapidly increasing energy bills.

### **PA Response**

A generous grant was made to cover outstanding utility bills as well as covering energy costs for the next few months. This removed a lot of financial pressure from the family and provided some light in their lives. The Rector commented on their relief when he passed on the grant cheque, "I wish you could have seen the look of joy on their faces".

# Charitable Services Report



**Families hurting as energy costs and food inflation bite hard**

**At Protestant Aid, we don't have to wait for newspaper reports to tell us that inflation is biting hard at family budgets - our own experience via our General Grant application programme shows clearly that financial struggles are part of a daily routine for too many families.**

## **When poverty comes knocking The working poor**

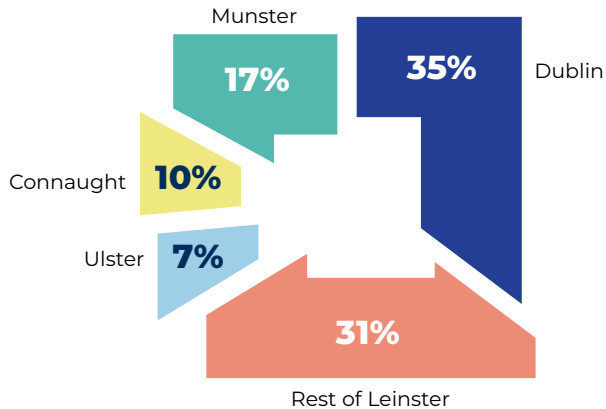
Traditionally, employment was central to at least moderate prosperity, opening up financial pathways to benefit not just the individual, but all members of the home. All that seems to have changed, with the ESRI reporting that the 'working poor' account for one third of those below the poverty line, with lone parents accounting for another significant number. Tenants were also hit hard - the consistent poverty rate for those living in owner-occupied dwellings was just 2.2% compared with 12.9% for those living in rented accommodation.

## **Young and elderly particularly vulnerable**

Food poverty was more than evident during 2022. Unfortunately, this often has a knock-on effect on a child's education, with pupils who go to school hungry often finding it harder to concentrate in class.

**This correlates with the experience of Food Banks, which are reporting record numbers of people seeking help due to soaring food prices.**

These increases, in tandem with a surge in heating costs, mean that the 'at risk of poverty rate' for all older people aged 65+, has almost doubled since 2020 (19% compared to 9.8%). As you read these words, Ireland has over 160,000 older people living in poverty or at risk of poverty, representing the highest increase of any age group.

## COMPASSION IN ACTION

### House burglary adds to financial woes

Philip\*, a single unemployed man, is a Service User of HSE Mental Health Services due to chronic mental health issues - he also has physical health issues requiring inpatient hospital treatment. During a recent hospital stay, his home was burgled, with much damage caused. He recently received a large gas bill and was unable to pay this, having had to fund home repairs after the burglary. His Social Worker requested help towards this worrying debt.

### PA Response

During what was a very difficult time for this applicant, we were in a position to assist with his gas bill and relieve a huge amount of stress. We received a touching letter of thanks from this client thanking us for 'removing a huge weight' from his shoulders. All made possible by the generosity of our donors.

## No pretty face to poverty

2022 was a watershed year for Protestant Aid with a 22% increase in General Grant applications and a 26% increase in funds granted. You will read about some of the cases we dealt with throughout this Annual Report - we encountered some appallingly difficult situations.

**There is no pretty face to poverty, with so many families facing a daily grind just to survive. As always, reasons vary, with inflation often the exacerbating factor in addition to existing problems of family breakdown/separation, physical or mental health issues, homelessness or addiction.**

We know of people turning off their freezer to save money, sleeping on their sitting room couch or going to bed early to save on heating costs. Others are skipping meals in an attempt to cut down, increasingly finding themselves destitute, hungry, demoralised and priced out of the cheapest bag of apples at the supermarket. This is the reality for many in 21st century Ireland.

## Moments of light

As always, describing situations of financial difficulty is not where it stops for Protestant Aid. I am personally thankful to and for a dedicated Grants Committee team, who combine hard work and compassion when reviewing a huge number of applications - sincere thanks to Canon Katharine Poulton, Glynis Good, Mary Neill, Robert Neill, Bryan Dobson, Robert Bell, Mark Younge and our Chairman, David Pierce, for their unstinting devotion to this task.

The faithful generosity of our donors also continues to provide encouragement to us as well as practical support to those in need, and we remain very grateful for this kindness, as do so many of those who send notes of thanks:

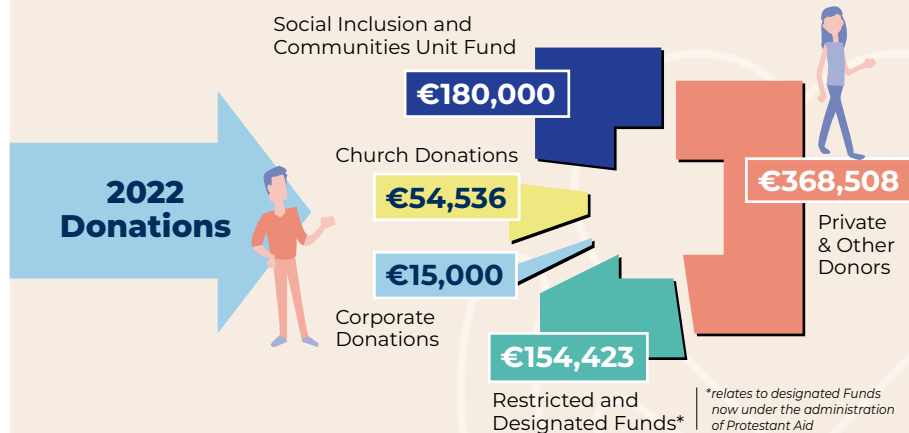

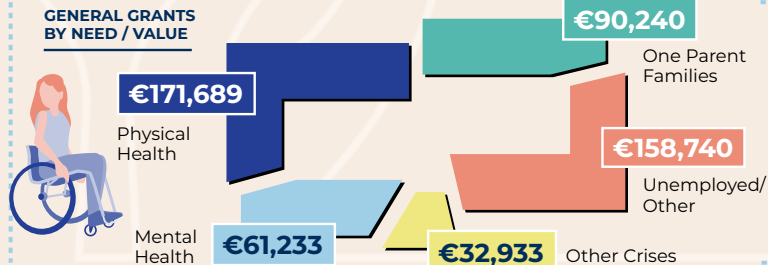
## The Department of Rural & Community Development

Protestant Aid is authorised by the Revenue Commissioners as an approved body under the Scheme of Tax Relief for Donations to eligible Charities and other Approved Bodies under the terms of Section 848A Taxes Consolidation Act 1997.

This means that if you pay tax and donate €250 or more in one calendar year, by reclaiming tax on your donation we can increase it by an extra 45% - at no extra cost to you. For example, if you donate €250, that could be worth €362.32 to PA.

To enable PA to claim this relief all you need to do is to complete a form (CHY3 Enduring Certificate - valid for 5 years or CHY4 Annual Certificate - valid for 1 year).

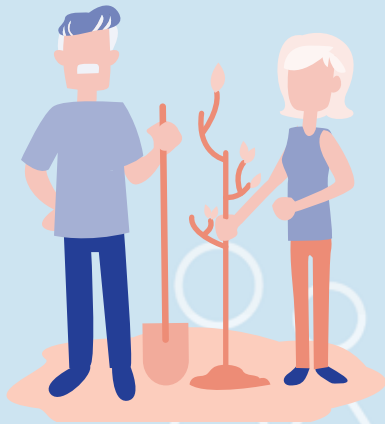

We were also pleased to grant €50,000 to help fit and equip the houses at Kingston College (Cork) for Ukrainian families, supporting a tremendous initiative by the Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, Dr. Paul Colton, bringing badly needed housing to Ukrainian refugees.

## COMPASSION IN ACTION

### Domestic violence splits family

Sheila\* is an unemployed mother with five children ranging from 4 to 16. She is a survivor of domestic violence and was forced to get a barring order to ensure her safety. Her youngest child has a Developmental Delay and ASD and requires a high level of support. The family is cramped into a two-bedroom city centre apartment with no lift (three sleeping in one bedroom, two in the other and mum on a couch in the living room) and had little room to move around, so Sheila's Social Worker requested help towards the cost of bunk beds.

### PA Response

We responded immediately with a grant that funded bunk beds and storage units so that the families living space would be more functional. The Social worker wrote, "In the midst of all their turmoil, this family were deeply touched and thankful to Protestant Aid for your kindness."

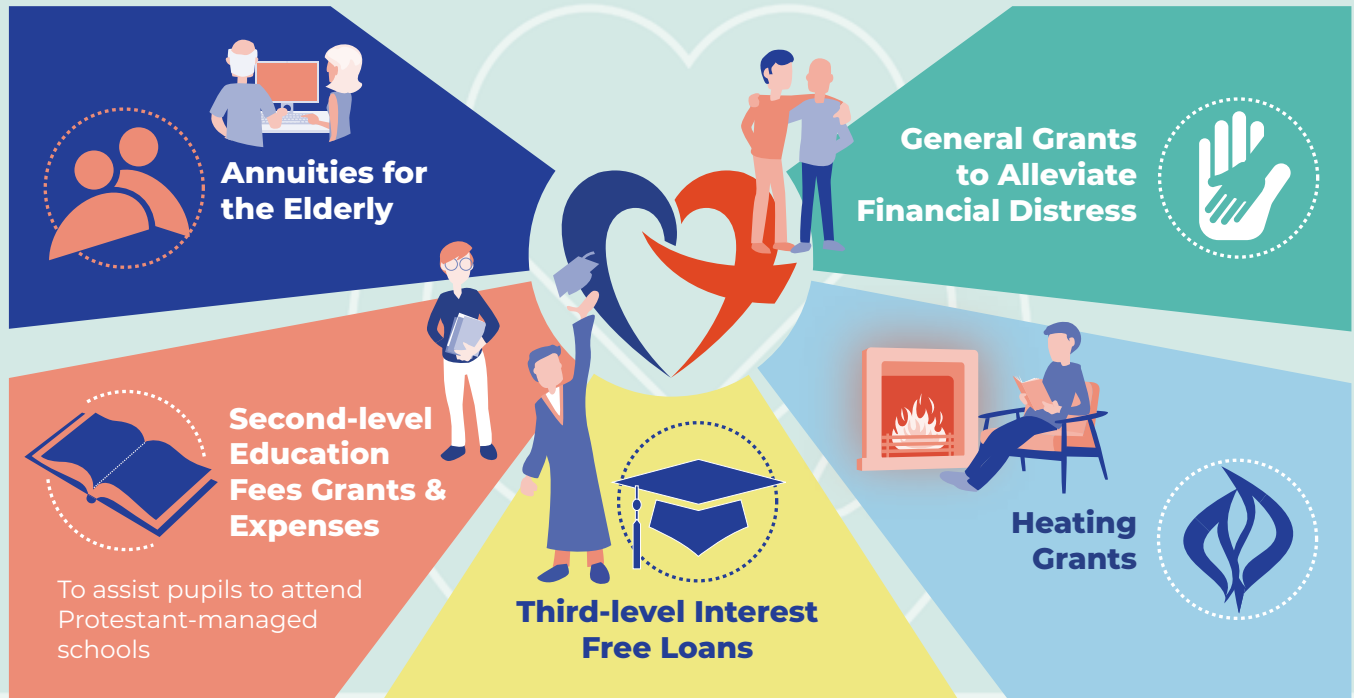
